


President's Message Peter Fitton

In 2025 TIA will focus on more River Safety and Community Support initiatives. In addition to our ongoing commitment to the replacement of worn-out rock shoal markers, a CPR and AED training session is planned to be offered again, and attention will be given to promoting education about Fire Pumps procurement, training, and maintenance.

TIA Continues to Invest in Replacement Markers

TIA's flagship program is the placement and monitoring of Coast Guard compliant special purpose hazard buoys, now numbering over 200, to mark shoals in the Canadian waters of the Thousand Islands from the east end of Howe Island to Brockville. TIA manages and monitors the placement of these shoal markers with a sophisticated GPS mapping program and an individual marker identification system.

TIA is grateful to TLTI and the Town of Gananoque for the significant grants that respond to the safety of the river community and constituents.

Over the past 90 years, the TIA shoal marking program has become an essential service to the safety and well-being of the river community and an integral part of the waterway's infrastructure, just like roadway signage on the mainland. Among those who benefit from having these hazards marked are property owners, service providers, emergency rescue, and of course local and visiting boaters

Shoal markers are subject to all sorts of adverse conditions. In addition to weathering, many markers repeatedly pound on the shoal they are marking because of water current, wave, and wind action. When this happens, the markers can become waterlogged and sit too low in the water. This source of damage to the base of the markers is worse when river levels decline later in the summer and into the fall, especially in low-water-level years. Additionally, the anchoring tackle sometimes fails, and some these markers are never recovered in spite of TIA's search efforts. Consequently, there is an annual need to replace about 15% of these markers.


As funding becomes available, TIA is replacing its wornout rock marker inventory. This year, the Township of Leeds and the Thousand Islands (TLTI) provided \$7,383.00 and the Town of Gananoque provided \$4,462.00 in funding contributions, and with other general donations and support TIA was able to purchase 35 replacement rock markers.


Water Level Update:

Precipitation Slowed this Fall Vince Barton, Ken White, Ross Stewart

Your guides in separating truth from fiction and old memories when it comes to water levels.

Understanding Net Basin Supply

Runoff, precipitation and evaporation all play into the overall levels of the basin levels.



What is the current water level?

September saw 81% of average precipitation in the LO basin (2.69" vs. avg of 3.31"), October saw 57% of average precip in the LO basin (1.85" vs. 3.27" avg), and after a few wet days, November is at 76% through November 24th. Precipitation north of the border made the difference!

The Lake Ontario basin saw significant precipitation over a 3-day period from 11/20-11/22 (Wed-Fri) - 1.14" entered the basin in just these 3 days out of the 1.93" received for the entire month through 11/24. SNOW!

We're now only 6" above Chart Datum in Alex Bay, up from 1-inch! Lake Ontario & the Upper River are 6" below average for last week of November. That's 244.06' elevation for the 24th.



We hope you all have your boats safely on the land for the winter! Happy Holidays from the Water Level Committee

Is the water level really that low?

We all suffer from memory errors, from seeing lots of 'normal levels' and very few really LOW levels. River Rats are saying they've "never seen it so low! Who let the plug out?" The water is near normal, NOT Crazy Low!


Vince went back 26 years on Nov 24th and found only 4 years lower than 2024 and another 6 within 2 1/4". That's almost 40% very close to this year!

Data: 2024 - 244.06', 2022 - 244.16', 2016 - 244.26', 2014 - 244.23', 2012 - 243.64', 2007 - 243.73', 2004 - 244.26', 2002 - 243.90', 2000 - 244.23', 1999 - 244.16', 1998 - 243.80'

What is the forecast for the next 6 months?

For the next 6 months, Nov-April as well as 2024. The range from dry to wet is deceptively huge, with the 50% probability of exceedance staying below average. Such a wide forecast range happens every year. In essence there is little to no correlation to spring levels!

Vince's Case in Point: "November 24th, 2016, saw a water level of 244.26, barely more than 2" above where we are this year on November 24th, 2024. I think we all remember what happened in the spring of 2017 - clearly, [2016] November's water level did NOT mean low water in the spring!"




Spotlight - Anna Cowan MA Environment Ambassador

Anna Cowan, a member of the Cowan family on Minota Island in the Admiralty Group, introduced herself to the Thousand Islands Association (TIA) in early 2020 in response to a TIA Petition sent to Ottawa about a call to action for controlling extreme water levels and the environmental impacts such as shoreline resiliency when left unchecked. Anna was in her third year of an Honors Degree in the Environment Program at McGill University. Her Major was in Ecological Detriments of Health, and her minor was in Interdisciplinary Life Sciences. TIA welcomed Anna's interest in TIA, and she quickly became involved in Program Development with TIA's Environmental Committee headed by Britton Bedford-Jones at the time.

In the spring of 2021, and with the support from ECO Canada Summer Student Co-op funding, TIA launched the position of Environment Ambassador with Anna Cowan being the perfect candidate. Her 16-week assignment was to promote TIA's Mission Pillars with a focus on Environmental Awareness through TIA Program Development and messaging using social media. This included liaison with Save The River in Clayton and adopting community engagement events such as river clean up days. Anna then became the youngest TIA Board Director for a two-year term that started in October 2021.



After graduation, Anna spent just under two years at the Thousand Islands Boat Museum (TIBM) as the Communications and **Engagement Coordinator where** she worked with the TIBM team to promote and grow the Museum and engage visitors with our fascinating river history.

This past summer Anna returned to TIA with a Work Plan to support program activities under our River Safety, Environmental Awareness, and Community Support Mission Pillars. Her Social Media posts recognized TIA business sponsors and connected the River Community with

messaging about events such as River Clean up days.

Anna comes from a long line of River Rats, tracing back to the 1890s when W.G Matthews bought Minota Island in the Admiralty group. Six generations later, Anna and her family still enjoy summers on the river. Anna grew up on the water and credits her passion for protecting the environment to her time spent in our collective slice of paradise.



Natural Signs that Predict Winter Weather?

Two of the most common predictors of the severity of winters are the coloured bands of a wooly bear caterpillar and the abundance of acorns.

One popular myth surrounds the abundance of or scarcity of acorns as a predictor of the length and severity of the upcoming winter. The truth is that oak trees and many others, have irregular cycles of boom and bust. Every 2 to 5 years a boom or "mast year" occurs, where large oaks can drop up to 10,000 acorns in the fall. This particular fall saw a huge abundance of acorns and thus according to lore predicts a harsh winter.

Whether the acorns can predict the weather is another question but an over abundant supply of acorns and winter food can definitely increase the survival rate of wildlife. Wildlife that forages throughout the winter months depend upon these mast years to be able to flourish and reproduce.

The Folklore of the Wooly Bear Caterpillar

The Wooly Bear is actually the caterpillar of the Isabella Tiger Moth and has a head and tail in black and a rusty coloured centre. Folklore states that the longer the black head and tail, the longer, snowier and more harsh the upcoming winter will be.

If this were true the wooly bears that I have seen this fall "predict" that our winter will be relatively mild with a bit of harshness near the end.




