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### Water Levels

Winter saw little snow but you'd never know it from the water levels. The Gananoque River has overflowed its banks and is encroaching on the sculpture park.



Down River, at Ed Huck Marine in Rockport, Scott MacCrimmon says "It's rained so much recently, water levels at the Cornwall dam are half a metre above chart datum. Thankfully our docks are mostly floaters!"

On January 7, 2017 Plan 2014 (created by the International Joint Commission) went into effect, It is designed to provide for more natural variations of water levels of Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River. According to Save The River there is a last minute effort now underway by some to cancel it and they have taken their fight to President Donald Trump. # Charlie Cliffe

On Feb 10, 2017 the River lost one of its own. Charlie Cliffe, aged 87 and builder of Cliffe Craft boats, passed away at home in Lansdowne. Charlie built hundreds of wooden (and a few fibreglass) boats over the years. We caught up with Charlie last summer as he talked to the kids at TIBM after they had repaired a wooden boat.

"When I was a kid the St Lawrence skiff dominated the River because it was meant to row ... everybody had a flat bottom boat with a set of oars (chuckling) and there weren't too many motors. A big motor back then was 5hp! As the power got bigger we had to build a hull that could take the horsepower. I was certainly influenced by Lyman's lapstrake boats. The overlap creates a lot of strength (and) wooden boats certainly feel different in the water. They don't ride up, they cut through like a knife, which is hard to duplicate in fibreglass or aluminum..."

"If you like this kind of thing (fixing old wooden boats), you get motivated ... the idea of a wooden boat and how it handles in the water ... it captures your imagination and you get captivated ... I understand that ... it happened to me. It's a great way to get on the water and have some fun."

When asked by one of the kids how long it would take to build a boat Charlie said "that would depend on how much pressure the customer put on him".

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# History of the White Rock Markers in the Thousand Islands

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82 years ago, in 1934, a few islanders in the Admiralty Group (near Gananoque) formed the TIA to protect cottages from vandalism. A few years later Howard Gowing, Ralph Britton and Gus Schwarz started on their own, to mark the rocky shoals that were a constant hazard. While they may have wintered thousands of miles apart, these original few got together every Spring and roped 2 x 4 lumber together, painted the sticks yellow and attached them to a paint can filled with cement. Old painted beer kegs, emblazoned with the names of these early few, often joined the early shoal markers on the River.



Why So Many Shoals? Our 1000 Islands area is unique. It is one of the largest rivers in the world flowing "over" an ancient mountain range. It even has an underwater waterfall higher than Niagara Falls! The shoals are mountains that are worn down. Watch this Aquatarium video and learn more about our area, The Frontenac Arch Biosphere, at *bit.ly/209WITM*. The next generation of markers were the Styrofoam "pill boxes". These were painted fluorescent green, and were easily placed, stored and removed with little maintenance. They were the preferred marker of choice by all the River Residents and would still be in use today but for the Coast Guard. Both the U.S. and Canadian Coast Guards insisted on a regulatory standard, of the type we use today. What started as lightweight, highly visible, low cost, became todays' large, 5' x 9", 60 lbs. markers costing nearly \$200.00 each. TIA didn't have the funds to purchase the needed 100 units (\$100.00 each at the time). Fortunately, Save the River came to the rescue and donated \$10,000.00 to upgrade all of Canada's markers, and create new ones on the American side as well.

Markers were still being installed and removed by volunteers like Tom Cunningham, Bill Hale and Grahame Armstrong. When the job became too onerous, TIA contracted the work to Gananoque's Tom Harrison and later his son Mark. During that time, Hubert Huntley was doing the job in the Ivy Lea area, and the Brockville Yacht club did the Brockville area.

These days, lan Huntley has replaced his Grandfather and taken over the rest of the River from Howe Island to the foot of Grenadier Island.

A group of individuals in Brockville, formerly the Dive Club under the leadership of Linus Mulder look after the markers in the Brockville section of the St. Lawrence.

Currently, TIA pays for all River shoal markers and maintenance including installation of about 200 markers on the Canadian side of the River. TIA's shoal marker partner, Save the River places the markers on the US side.



#### AMENDMENT TO CUSTOMS ACT

A few years ago a New York fisherman was stopped near the Gananoque Narrows by an agent of the Canada Border Services Agency and was charged with failing to report in with Canadian authorities.

We were all shocked that he had done anything wrong but contrary to what we all thought, existing Canadian law requires that any American boat entering Canadian waters must report to Canadian Border Services.

Canadian Senator Bob Runciman and MP Gord Brown took up the issue. Mr. Brown introduced a private member's bill to amend the legislation but it was not embraced by the government and didn't pass.

Senator Runciman then introduced a Senate bill and it has received Government support. Second reading is complete and is expected to pass in the Senate and then get passed in the House of Commons this Spring.

The Bill provides that a boater who enters Canadian waters and then returns to his /her originating country, need not report to Canadian authorities if he/she did not disembark, anchor, moor, or make contact with another vessel while in Canadian waters.

Senator Runciman said: "It is not my intent with Bill S-233 to make our border more porous and I do not believe this bill will have that effect. It is my intent to make border reporting more practical in specific circumstances, such as in the sometimes-confusing geography of the Thousand Islands. There are other regions of Canada where the same issue is at play." Stay tuned for further developments.
